


Letter from the Executive Director

Escaping into the library



"We didn't have bookshelves in our apartment. When you're poor, there is very little access to anything. The freedom to be able to read as many books as you can, to disappear into the land of Dr. Seuss and Curious George was an escape for me."

Those are the words of award-winning actress Viola Davis to an audience at the 2018 American Library Association annual conference as she told the story of walking from kindergarten to the Adams Memorial Library in Central Falls, Rhode Island, where she stayed until after dark every day. Her early life was shaped by her access to books and by the actions of a kind librarian who fed her while she was there.

Davis's fame allows her library memories to be amplified, but there are thousands of children every day who are quietly collecting the same kinds of wonderful memories in branches of the Louisville Free Public Library. Memories of reading great books, of gaining computer access, of seeing music and dance and theatre performances for the first time, of being helped by kind librarians. And, you are making their memories possible with your gifts to the Library Foundation. Thank you very much for that. Who knows what great things those children may go on to do!
